#### LWVLCF Annual Meeting

#### The Annual Meeting Materials you will be receiving soon will include a proposed dues increase in 2015/16 as recommended by the Budget Committee and approved by the Board. Below is some background information.

#### Q. What dues are we currently paying and for what period of time?

A. We pay \$52.00 per individual membership and \$70.00 per household membership. If you join after March, you pay only \$5.00/mo.until the next year. Our program and fiscal year runs from July 1, 2015- June 30, 2016.

#### Q. Where do our dues go?

*A.* \$32.00 goes to LWVUS per individual membership and \$48.00 per household membership. \$11.00 will go to the LWVNC per individual and \$16.50 for household. That leaves \$9.00 per individual and \$5.50 per household for our local League use.

#### Q. What would the increase mean and how does that affect our budget per member?

A. The board is proposing an increase to \$60.00 per individual member and \$75.00 per household. That will provide \$17.00 per individual member and \$10.50 for a household membership for local use. As you can see, we gain less local income for a family membership, but they are important too.

#### Q. What are our proposed local expenses?

A. Our proposed local budget for our programs comes to \$1,700.00. With the amount of money going to national and state dues, without a dues increase, we will have to make up more than \$1,100.00 in fundraising and donations to make our budget balance. Even with the dues increase, we will need to raise around \$700.00 to make our budget income balance with expenses. We will still need fundraising and donations.

#### Q. What makes up our local expenses?

A. Please refer to the budget line items for this answer. We have fixed costs for our website and our post office box that include nearly \$300. These do change slightly year to year. In addition, most of our program costs go to support operating expenses, candidate forums, voter registration drives, lunches for Hot Topic speakers, postage for committees and and printing. We also want to help support travel expenses for those who attend statewide trainings and the conventions. Nearly all of our members readily donate time and resources for our efforts.

#### Q. Do we have a reserve of cash on hand in case of fiscal problems?

A. Yes, we try to make sure we carry over \$1,000 in cash for this purpose.
